The heart may conceive and the head devise in vain if the hand be not prompt to execute the design.

Grand honours

Grand Honours, in this jurisdiction, appears to have bestowed upon itself certain honours unilaterally. The Grand Lodge Committee on Rituals has studied this carefully and finds that nowhere in any of our rituals is the sign we call Grand Honours communicated to the candidate. There is no indication Grand Honours are, or ever have been, a secret sign restricted to Master Masons.

Grand Honours were first given in public at the July 1872 mortuary cornerstone laying in

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New Westminster, and continue to be given in public at funerals and cornerstone laying. They were given by Entered Apprentices at installation ceremonies, until the ceremony was revised in 1921. A recommendation in 1946 to Grand Lodge to change Grand Honours from the present (English Funeral Grand Honours) to the Third Degree English Grand and Royal Sign was defeated. Other iurisdictions have Public and Private Grand Honours, of which the latter, by their very nature, cannot be given in public under any circumstances

The committee therefore recommended that Grand Honours as we know it in this jurisdiction be given in any degree or in public as and when required in our ceremonies. At our last Annual Communication this recommendation was duly adopted by the brethren of this jurisdiction.

Kootenay Lodge No. 15 is back in the lodge room that was damaged by smoke and water during a fire last November. An open house was held on Saturday, 20 November, showing off the refurbished premises to the brethren and their friends and families.

Rather than being a sitdown dinner, it was more of a cocktail party: the guest were free to mingle, sit or stand, while waiters presented various hors d'oeuvres throughout the evening. Thus, anyone was free to chat with anyone else, rather than just his immediate table partners.

And of course, the room came with its own bartender.

All guests were given \$1000 in "funny-money" which they gambled away at the blackjack and roulette tables run by professional croupiers. A few brethren made some official remarks, but mostly it was an informal affair: any man was free to ask any question of any freemason there.

It was a smash hit. Over forty tickets were sold, and the attendees were nearly 70% non-mason.

Besides being a lot of fun, Melrose Lodge received two signed petitions, and they expect to have four others sign up very soon.

Melrose Lodge is going to make this an annual event every October.

William Saint Clair of Roslin

The First Grand Master Mason of Scotland, William Saint Clair, was elected in 1736 when the Grand Lodge of Scotland was formed, an office he held for one year only. A good deal of discussion has been had pro and con as to the validity of two old documents known as the Saint Clair Charters, one dated about 1601 and one 1628, in which documents the statement is made that the Operative

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Masons of Scotland had conferred upon the family of Saint Clair of Roslin the honour of being recognized as Patron and Protector of the Craft. In 1736 when a first Grand Master was to be chosen for the Scottish Grand Lodge, William Saint Clair was made a freemason in the Lodge Canongate Kilwinning and he also formally resigned all claims to be Patron and Protector of the freemasons in Scotland on 30 November of the same year at a meeting held at Edinburgh. William Saint Clair died in 1778.

Grand Lodge of Scotland records his initiation on 18 May 1736 and passing on 2 June 1736 in Lodge Canongate Kilwinning. He was installed on St. Andrew's day 1736. Excerpted from Albert G. Mackey Encyclopedia of Freemasonry.

Evil

The story goes that at a certain college there was a professor with a reputation for being tough on students of religious conviction. At the first class every semester he proceeded to degrade them and to mock their statement of faith.

One semester, he asked the students of they believed in God and a young man raised his hand. The professor asked, "Did God make everything. young man?"

He replied, "Yes sir he did!" The professor responded, "If God made everything, then he made evil."

The student didn't have a response and the professor was happy to once again prove God to be a myth. Then another man raised his hand and asked, "May I ask you something, sir?"

"Yes, you may," answered the professor.

The young man stood up and said, "Sir, is there such a thing as cold?"

Of course there is, what kind of a question is that?

Haven't you ever been cold?"

The young man replied, "Actually, sir, cold doesn't exist. What we consider to be cold is really an absence of heat. Absolute zero is when there is absolutely no heat, but cold does not really exist. We have only created that term to describe how we feel when heat is not there."

The young man continued, "Sir, is there such a thing as dark?"

Once again the professor responded, "Of course there is."

And once again, the student replied, "Actually, sir, darkness does not exist. Darkness is really only the absence of light. Darkness is only a term developed to describe what happens when there is no light present."

Finally, the young man asked, "Sir, is there such a thing as evil?"

The professor responded, "Of course, we have rapes, murders and violence everywhere in the world. Those thing are evil."

The student replied, "Actually, sir, evil does not exist. Evil is simply the absence of God. Evil is a term developed to describe the absence of God. God did not create evil. It isn't like truth, or love which exist as virtues like heat or light. Evil is simply the state where God is not present, like cold without heat, or darkness without light."

Thus endeth the lesson.

Antimasonry

In their thirty-four article *Covenant* released in 1988, the Islamic Resistance Movement defined its goals and objectives, and its world view. Freemasonry is erroneously and unfortunately mentioned several times as an enemy of Islam.

"...Freemasons, Rotary Clubs, espionage groups and others, which are all nothing

more than cells of subversion and saboteurs."

"These organizations operate in the absence of Islam and its estrangement among its people. The Islamic peoples should perform their rôle in confronting the conspiracies of these saboteurs. The day Islam is in control of guiding the affairs of life, these organizations, hostile to humanity and Islam, will be obliterated."

"They were behind the French Revolution, the Communist revolution and most of the revolutions we heard and hear about, here and there. With their money they formed secret societies, such as Freemasons, Rotary Clubs, the Lions and others in different parts of the world for the purpose of sabotaging societies..."

"With their money they were able to control imperialistic countries and instigate them to colonize many countries in order to enable them to exploit their resources and spread corruption there."

"... Freemasons, The Rotary and Lions clubs, and other sabotage groups. All these organizations, whether secret or open, work in the interest of Zionism and according to its instructions. They aim at undermining societies, destroying values, corrupting consciences, deteriorating character and annihilating Islam. It is behind the drug trade and alcoholism in all its kinds so as to facilitate its control and expansion."

It is an unfortunate fact of our modern world that religious fundamentalists of whatever stripe continue to perceive Freemasonry as an active threat.
